


Jarweng Educational Development (JED)

Request for funding

A proposal to rebuild the schools that were destroyed by flooding in Pubor and Torkiel in South Sudan



Philosophy/Purpose/Mission

Jarweng Educational Development (JED) is a nonprofit 501(C3) charitable organization whose mission is to build schools in South Sudan. Its vision is to improve life through better education, healthcare and commerce. JED has supported education and self-sustaining schools for the last few years, even before the civil war crisis that recently devastated the region.

Background

During the 1980s and early early 1990s there was devastating civil war and drought in the Sudan. As a result, Thomas Nyang and his family were displaced from their home in the Jarweng community like many others. After fleeing to refugee camps in Ethiopia and then to Kenya, Mr. Nyang started his ministry of not only creating programs for his native Nuer language instruction as well as English language instruction but he also pastored to the Sudanese Christian community.

In 1994, the Nyang family was granted asylum in the United States. Thomas resumed his pastoral work in the U.S. and has provided local, national and international leaderships in his community church. His outreach work on behalf of the U.S. Sudanese community has included refugee settlement and relocation assistance, a summer meal program for under-served children, after-school tutoring, employment search assistance and skills training, Naath (Nuer) medical and legal interpretation services, and continuous fund-raising to support his projects. Mr. Nyang founded the Thok-Naath Language and Cultural Program (“Sustaining our heritage across two worlds”), in which he also teaches, in 2006.

Mr. Nyang was proud to become a U.S. citizen in 2001; nonetheless, his commitment to improving life and economic opportunity for those who remain in the land of his birth is ongoing. South Sudan became independent in 2011, but the challenges the region has always faced (lack of basic infrastructure, social services and civil war) remain. The diverse projects Mr. Nyang has undertaken over the years include clean water provision, re-construction of schools, an initiative to assist local fishermen as well as basic and technical education. In 2009 he founded Jarweng Educational Development (JED), a not-for-profit organization. Its vision is to improve life through better education, healthcare and commerce; its mission is to build schools in South Sudan. To date, JED has built two schools and conducted workshops and a seminar to teach computer and database skills.

Mission Statement

Our mission is to build schools in the South Sudan to improve the lives of many through better education, healthcare and commerce.

Goals/Objective

The general objective of this project proposal is to resurrect schools devastated by floods in Puobor and Torkiel areas located in South Sudan.

Education is the key to a better life. Through education we can better equip our community to be self-sustaining in many areas.

The proposed project is based on the following objectives

- To resurrect flood affected schools in Puobor and Torkiel.
- To educate both children and adults in a structured environment in order to maintain a self-sustaining educational system.
- To increase the quality of life by reducing the literacy rate amongst the communities.
- To decrease the number of at-risk children and orphan populations.

What We Need

We are actively seeking sponsors/partnerships to fund our overage program objective of building a school to educate not only the children but adults in the Purbor and Torkiel villages. The founder of JED (Thomas Nyang) will provide a hands on approach with the support of the local communities.
